

HEIDE DETECTIVE

▲ SCULPTURE PARK

Be an art detective and spell out a mystery word with this fun activity sheet for kids and parents to do together. Start outside the main reception area, follow the directions and use the clues to find out the answer. Suitable for children and parents of all ages.

DIRECTION	SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT	CLUE	ANSWER
1. In the plaza find a brightly coloured sculpture by Emily Floyd.	This sculpture is sometimes used as a library. The shelves in the back of the sculpture hold books that you can borrow to read while you are at Heide.	The title of the sculpture is spelt out in its shapes. Find the seventh letter of the first word in the sculpture's two word title. It's your clue. A _ _ _ _ _ L _ _ _ _	
2. Head towards Heide II, past the café. Look left to see a sculpture in a nook. You need to step down to see it properly.	This sculpture is titled <i>Circus by the Sea</i> . Can you find the shapes that look like waves?	One of the materials in this sculpture is a metal that starts with the letter B. What is the second letter in that metal?	
3. Continue on the gravel path past Heide II. The path can seem like a maze and inside one of the courtyards of the house is a sculpture by Vase Nikoleski. What does it remind you of?	This sculpture is hollow. The metal gets poured into a mould when it is a hot liquid, then it cools down and becomes solid.	This letter appears twice in the first word of the title. It is a small thing that grows and grow after it is planted.	
4. Go out of the courtyard you are now in, down three steps (not two) and follow the gravel path down the hill. Stop at the first fork in the path, <i>Small Sculpture for my grandmother's vase</i> is here.	Outdoor steel sculptures rust, turning the steel a deep brown red colour.	Does this sculpture look like an arrangement of flowers? What is the artist's first name? The second letter of his name is your clue.

<p>5. The gravel path will take you down the hill. Can you find two sculptures standing side by side by the same artist?</p>	<p>These sculptures are made of cement fondue. Both of them are based on human figures.</p>	<p>The artist's first name is David but what is his surname? _ O L L Y</p>	
<p>6. The next sculpture is not very far away, it looks like it might be slowly unwinding. The artist is from Australia, the sculpture was made of bronze, and the date is 2006.</p>	<p>Can you see the way that the artist has made the metal look like it is blowing in the wind, like a flag about to spread out?</p>	<p>What is the seventh letter of the one word title to this sculpture?</p>	I
<p>7. Taking the smaller path up towards the back of Heide II, find a small sculpture that looks like a soft toy sitting on top of a stone plinth.</p>	<p>This sculpture isn't soft at all, it's made from bronze, not underfelt, as the title suggests.</p>	<p>The second letter of the artist's first name is your seventh clue.</p>	
<p>8. Walk back down the path you just came up, follow the path straight through the Heide II kitchen garden. Look to your left and find a sculpture made of lots of repeating squares. It's taller than you are.</p>	<p>Walk all the way around the sculpture <i>Theoretical Matter</i>. Notice how the crossed metal bars create shapes or windows that allow you to see right through to the other side of the sculpture?</p>	<p>Read the artist's name. Fill in the missing letters N E _ L T A _ L O R. The first of the missing letters is your clue.</p>	
<p>9. The next sculpture is made from white marble, green bronze and clear resin. You can see it from here.</p>	<p>The sculpture is actually a large-scale model of inside the human ear, perfectly carved from marble.</p>	<p>Maybe the way that the forms of the sculpture suggest rivulets and channels for water inspired the artist to give this sculpture its title? What is the letter that comes after N in the sculpture's title?</p>	



- 10.** Your last sculpture is hidden in some trees across the grass from where you are. Stand still and look carefully, can you see two red poles anywhere?
- The artist Les Kossatz make this sculpture in memory of a boy who used to play in these trees. What shape is hanging at the centre of the sculpture?
- Who was this sculptural 'keepsake' made for? The last letter of his name is your last clue. Well done!
